FindHelp Information

Washington County is launching a new site to help community members connect to services more easily. The site will be hosted on a platform called findhelp which enables users to quickly pinpoint the services they need by zip code then by category such as: food, utility, and housing assistance, legal help, employment support, and counseling.

In the coming months, the County will launch a branded version of the site called Help in Washington PA (<u>washingtonpa.findhelp.com</u>). Local human services agencies are being asked to add their programs or verify the information on their program listings on <u>washingtonpa.findhelp.com</u> so that they may be represented in the search results. Arc Washington was established in 1952 by a group of parents of children with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities or I/DD (then known as mental retardation).


In an effort to adapt to meet the changing needs of our community, Arc Washington restructured its services, resulting in a corporate parent and two subsidiaries, which are private, non-profit organizations under Section 501(c) 3 of the Internal Revenue Code: AAdvantage Inc.; Arc Human Services Inc.; and The Arc of Washington County.

Arc serves individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and mental illness in the following counites in Western Pennsylvania: Washington, Allegheny, Beaver, Butler, Clearfield/Jefferson, Fayette, Clarion, Crawford, and Greene.

Arc Human Services (AHS) maintains operations for all residential programming, employment and home and community services in various counties in Western Pennsylvania for individuals with developmental disabilities and mental illness. Its mission is to teach individual skills so that they may successfully live and work in their community.

Most services can be accessed through referrals from Supports Coordinators/Case Managers. More information can be obtained through the website contact portal or by calling the office at 724-745-3010.



Current programs include:

- Residential Services (Trauma Informed Care Model)
- Home and Community Services (Behavioral Consultation and Skill Building/Habilitation, Summer Camp, and Specialized Training)
- Employment Services (Transitional Employment Services,
 Supported Employment, Job Finding)
- Student Transition Program
- Supports Brokering Services
- Community Residential Rehabilitation Services (Residents live in a home-like setting & receive counseling)
- Mental Health Supportive Housing (Residents are semiindependent and receive subsidies to maintain housing)
- Shelter Plus Care (Residents receive similar services as MH Supportive Housing and must meet Federal Definition of "homeless")

Brain Injury Awareness Month

March is Brain Injury Awareness Month

A brain Injury can make learning difficult for anyone, especially children. Brain injury can impact a student's ability to process information, maintain focus and attention, commit information to memory, regulate emotions and behavior, organize, plan, and more. Brain injury can also affect physical functions such as vision, hearing, balance and coordination.

The BrainSTEPS Program

In 2007, the Pennsylvania Department of Health created the BrainSTEPS Program (Strategies Teaching Educators, Parents, and Students) to help students, their families, and school staff understand brain injury and how to support student learning. BrainSTEPS is available to schools, families, and students in Pennsylvania in grades kindergarten through twelfth grade who sustain acquired brain injuries at any point after birth. Students are referred by school personnel, parents, medical, or rehabilitation staff either online at www.brainsteps.net or by phone.

BrainSTEPS consulting teams are housed within the regional Intermediate Units across the state under the PA Department of Education. School personnel implementing BrainSTEPS are provided with in-depth brain injury training that allows them to identify student strengths and weaknesses following brain injury, and ensure these students receive individualized, appropriate educational and community supports until they graduate from high school. BrainSTEPS team members are also able to provide more generalized training for district wide in-services.

More About Brain Injuries

Acquired brain injuries include any injury to the brain sustained after a period of development and includes all traumatic brain injuries (injury caused by an external force and includes concussions) and non-traumatic brain injuries (strokes, tumors, seizures, aneurysms, etc.). BrainSTEPS Teams assist school staff to develop educational programs, academic interventions, strategy implementation, and monitoring of students who have sustained brain injury. Teams conduct the following consultation activities:

- Education and awareness of brain injury for school professionals
- Consultation from local medical & rehabilitation professionals
- · Hospital to school re-entry planning
- IEP and 504 Plan development
- Academic interventions
- Strategy implementation
- Educational programming
- Monitoring of students until graduation
- Brain Injury trainings for schools and families

BrainSTEPS School-Based Return to Learn Concussion Management Teams

Approximately 80% of the traumatic brain injury (TBI) referrals made to BrainSTEPS are for students' post-concussion. In 2013, the PA Department of Education asked BrainSTEPS to create a Return to Learn Concussion Management Team model and Return to Learn School Protocol that would train and guide school-based teams to support students following concussion for 4 weeks, at which point the local Intermediate Unit BrainSTEPS Team would be invited to support the school teams.

To date, BrainSTEPS has trained over 3,000 school-based Return to Learn Concussion Management <u>Teams</u> in Pennsylvania. The Return to Learn Concussion Management Team model serves as a statewide screening tool for students who require higher level support following concussion. BrainSTEPS supports both student athletes and non-athletes, regardless of the cause of their concussion.

School-based teams include academic and symptom monitors who serve as the gatekeepers for all students in their building who sustain concussions and they track academics and symptoms weekly through recovery. The teams are provided with a Concussion Return to Learn Electronic Monitoring Toolkit that includes teacher accommodation letters, a parent letter questioning history of modifiers, an Academic Monitoring Tool, and Symptom Monitoring Tool (elementary/middle/high school versions), as well as concussion in the classroom materials.

BrainSTEPS is funded by the PA Department of Health and the PA Department of Education, Bureau of Special Education via the PaTTAN Network and is implemented by the Brain Injury Association of Pennsylvania.
